Identify different types of sailing boat

Match the descriptions to the pictures of different types of boat:

- A. Singlehanded dinghy (e.g. Laser Pico) a small, open boat often sailed by one adult (or one or two children). Typically it has a single mainsail and a dagger board that lifts out.
- **B.** Yacht a large boat (normally over 20 feet long), normally sailed by multiple people. It has multiple sails and a cabin, allowing it to be used for multiday journeys.
- C. Multi-hull (e.g. Hobiecat) a boat with two or more hulls connected by a deck or "trampoline" often faster & more stable than a mono-hull.

- D. Keelboat a large (20-30 feet long) mono-hulled boat with a fixed, weighted keel (the bit under the water to stop it tipping over) and multiple sails. Normally sailed by two or more adults.
- **E.** Doublehanded dinghy (e.g. Wayfarer) a larger open boat, that is normally sailed by two adults (or larger children). Typically it has two or more sails and will often have a centre board that pivots, instead of lifts out.
