Welcome to our 2017-18 annual report

I think it has been another good year for 1st Hensingham Scout Group.

The everyday adventure our young members enjoy is only possible thanks to our dedicated team of leaders.

We have had more new recruits to the leadership team this year with Laura Bell, Brian Penny, Dan Pocock, Dan Easdon and Michael Bannerman joining us. Sadly we've also said good bye to some of our volunteers; I would like to thank Becky Sparkes for her work with Beavers and Cubs over the last few years as she moved back to Cheshire, and wish her happy Scouting with 15th Macclesfield Beavers.

As well as our adults leaders it's great to see a number of our former Beavers, Cubs and Scouts coming back to help their old sections as Young Leaders. Our Young Leaders do a fantastic job helping our adult volunteers run the sections and sharing their enthusiasm with the young people. A big thanks has to be given to our cubs, who have tried and done their best all the activities we have given them to do.

Two of our leaders left due to other commitments, and we all would like to say a great big thanks to them both for the time and energy they have given.

In 2018, cub scouting promises to be even more challenging and adventurous so watch out for news as it appears.



It's been a very busy year for Helvellyn & Skiddaw Troops – we've awarded over 200 Challenge and Activity Badges, invested 30 new Scouts and have racked up 393 Scout-nights away across 9 different camps!

There've been plenty of opportunities for the Troop to find out about Scouting in other countries with our first JOTI sleep over last October proving a big hit with the Scouts and then our epic Summer Camp with Danish Scouts from Østerhøj-Måløv in August.

Summer camp was a huge success – with approximately 55 Scouts and leaders from both Groups camping together for 7 nights at Scout Adventures' Great Tower activity centre. As well as some some traditional Scouting and team building challenges, we took full advantage of the adventurous activities on offer with ghyll scrambling, rock climbing and axe throwing proving to be some of highlights for the Scouts. It was great for the leaders to see our Scouts integrating with the Danish young people so well, and we hope that they'll be able to stay in touch with their new friends. We've already started talking with the Danish leaders about another joint camp in 2020 and/or joining them for the next Danish Jamboree in 2022!



Through the year we've had a varied programme including some traditional Scouting – including cooking on open fires at various Troop meetings and at our "smokey hammocks camp" in April, team building & problem solving and developing our pioneering skills leading to us building a water slide at Group camp.



We are very proud that Otter and Eagle Patrols bagged 1st and 2nd place in the District cooking competition in

July. Otter Patrol will be representing the District at the County competition this October.



A number of our older Scouts successfully completed their Expedition Challenge in Eskdale last October, and our younger Scouts have started to develop their navigation skills, enjoying a hike over Cat Bells (followed by a swim in the lake) in the summer term.

We've also been getting involved with some environmental projects, helping the the National Park rangers remove non-native trees from Eskdale and planting native trees in Wasdale with the West Cumbria Rivers Trust!

Adventurous activities have remained a big part of this year's programme. In January we returned to WinterCamp where the Scouts got to try caving (in a bus), the big air bag drop, quad biking, laser tag and host of other activities (and the leaders got to try out the new wood-burner for the mess tent)!. May saw the return of District camp where we helped run many of the big activities. The warmer weather allowed us to return to Scarness for another season of kayaking and sailing, and we're thrilled that our new store has enabled us to set up an air rifle range so that we can offer the Master at Arms badge again.



Finally, we'd like to thank our young leaders Josh & Sam for all their help. We've had a great year and want to thank the Scouts for their enthusiasm and energy - we hope they're looking forward to 2018/19 as much as we are.



Treasurer's Report

The Group Finances for the financial year of 2017/18 remain healthy, increases in our major expenditure have occurred during this reporting period most notably being the need to secure a commercial storage unit to store and maintain our equipment. With just over 110 members and approximately 30/40 new starters/leavers each year our subscription and subsequent accounts are constantly changing.

The transition to using the Online Scout Manager (My.SCOUT) system for payments for camps and subscription has helped the Group leaders regain time to concentrate on running the respective section programmes. Please could I ask all those still paying by the other options to please consider switching to OSM for payments as it really helps our leaders! The system also automatically reminds you if you have overlooked making a payment, so for me this is great as we all sometimes need a little reminder in the busy lives that we lead! It is very important that our normal income can meet the expected annual costs and that the subs can be kept as low as possible, so thank you to everyone who pays promptly, your co-operation is very much appreciated.

In addition to our current account, in the 2017/18 the Committee looked to move funds from our reserve account to an account that would generate a small return on investment. Unfortunately the terms of this account changed and this changed our risk - the money has been moved back into the Natwest Business reserve account that we have held for a number of years. A slight increase in funds was generated in the new account and no monies were lost. The total amount held in reserve is considered to be sufficient to allow us to operate the normal activities of the Group for 12 months should income and fundraising activities fall short, as well as having adequate provision for future maintenance / disposal of our storage facility at Hensingham School. This account currently is "stable" as the current financial

market and subsequent low % returns on interest - yield very little for the group

The major source of normal income to supplement our funds from subscriptions remains our annual Gift Aid claim. With your help, gift aiding generated income to the order of just over £1900 this year. If you haven't signed up but are eligible, please do so - it's very simple and won't cost you a thing. Gift Aid is essential in helping the Group finances go further; togther subs and the money claimed from Gift Aid cover the basic running costs of the Group.

Most events and trips are self-financing but we do fundraise to allow us to offer financial support to those members who need it, as well allowing us to organise subsidised Group and social events (such as the AGM and Family camp for example). We have a nominal budget for each section's programmed activities throughout the year, any surplus money goes directly back into the Group funds.

Our main fundraising activities in the last financial year were the Fiesta night and the annual bag pack at Morrisons. These, together with other fundraising supported by friends and family of the Group raised in excess of £1800. Furthermore we were gifted generous donations, from both individuals and company/community funds, of just over £6000. These vital funds support the Group to renew "worn out" equipment, purchase new equipment to allow leaders to offer our members even more activities, and fund our programmes.

As usual, the Annual Returns and the year-end accounts for the previous financial year (2016/17) and updated Trustee information were submitted to the Charity Commission. A summary of our accounts is available on the Charity Commission website.

Finally I would like to take this opportunity to thank all our sponsors, benefactors and fundraisers for their continued support during this year.

Most of these parents have seen their children grow up through Beavers, Cubs and Scouts, and are leaving us because their association with 1st Hensingham has come to an end. We give them all our thanks for their contribution to the running of the group.

I'm pleased to report that, as a result of our plea for help earlier this year, we have a number of parents ready to fill the vacant positions following the AGM.

New Equipment Store

The main focus of the first half of the year was finding suitable alternative premises for our equipment store.

After much searching, we finally found a unit at Sneakyeat Industrial Estate and the move from our previous store at The Whitehaven Academy was completed in February under some quite wet conditions. A massive thank you goes to everyone who lent a hand, or a car or a van that day. Thanks to a donation from Shepley's of some shelving units we also have things more neatly stashed and accessible for use. In addition, our resourceful Leaders managed to find a way of setting up a range for air rifle shooting within the new store. This means that that the Scout section can now run the Master at Arms course which wasn't previously possible.

Fundraising

Bag packing: Our supermarket bag pack took place at Morrisons, this time in June, allowing our members to come face to face with the public and demonstrate their helpfulness, resulting in funds being raised for the group. Thank you to all members, parents and leaders who helped with this event.

Kit Sale: This year we collected your unwanted kit and clothing and a number of our families benefitted by picking up a bargain at the Kit sale held across a number of section nights. A respectable £70 went into our group funds, so thanks to all who supported this endeavour. Donations: We have been fortunate this year to receive donations from companies (Jacobs and BEPDT) due to members of staff nominating 1st Hensingham Scout Group as a worthy charitable recipient.
